A place where people feel afraid to walk down the street or voice their views in public for fear of racism or even violence is not the Islington I know and love. There is no place in our community for prejudice of any kind, so please rest assured that I will continue to do everything in my power to ensure that Islington once again becomes safe for all.

Safety for shop workers

This month I visited the Co-op on the Cally Road as part of USDAW's Support for Shopworkers day, and joined our local police on patrol around Upper Street. I'm really worried by the massive increase in violent, organised shoplifting which urgently needs greater attention from the government. No one should face threats or intimidation going to work every day and it is terrible to hear that for so many of our local shop workers, facing violence and abusive behaviour has become a normal part of the job.



I'm so proud of the work done by our police and community organisations like the Angel Bid, working together to keep shops safe. But it's clear that more needs to be done to protect shop workers and prevent retail crime on high streets like ours.



Infected Blood Scandal Vote

It's not often that you win a vote in opposition. But last Monday, we passed a Labour amendment setting up an independent body to administer compensation to the victims of the infected blood scandal - and handing Rishi Sunak a defeat.

Victims of the infected blood scandal have waited far too long for justice. It's testament to the hard fought campaigns led by victims and their families, and to the dedication of Labour's Diana Johnson MP, that they will finally receive the compensation they deserve. Sadly, far too many victims have passed away before reaching this point.

I was struck that this amendment passed by four votes: the same number as by-election seats won by Labour candidates in the last year. Every one of you who knocked on doors up and down the country has had a transformative impact on the lives of people affected by the infected blood scandal. Just imagine what winning a general election can do!

Challenging the Rwanda Bill


For the past two years, Labour has strongly opposed the government's unworkable and cruel plans to tackle illegal migration. But having already passed two laws in two years that have only made the problems in the system worse, Rishi Sunak is trying to pass another law to try and rescue his botched Rwanda deportation scheme. It's appalling that the government has already handed hundreds of millions of pounds to Rwanda for this expensive and ineffective gimmick, which is why Labour in government are committed to cancelling it and spending the money on hiring immigration caseworkers to clear the asylum backlog, and a new police unit to crack down on the criminal gangs.



At this month's <u>Attorney General oral questions</u>, I challenged the government to release the legal advice they had been given over the legality of this Bill. The Attorney General initially refused, before relenting days later. The British people deserve to know what the government has been advised about this Bill, especially with regard to whether it is compatible with the Ministerial and Civil Service codes, so I won't stop challenging them to make sure Britain remains steadfast in our commitment to the rule of law.



Visit to St Mary's Church and Tower



Last week I visited St Mary's Church and tower with the lovely people of Islington Guided Walks.

St Mary's has watched Islington grow from a small hamlet, renowned for its fresh air and market gardens, to the bustling, multicultural, inner-city gem we know today. I saw how Islington's history is traced through the church, from Norman stonework in the crypt, to the eighteenth century tower, to the 1950s main body rebuilt after St Mary's was bombed during the blitz.

We climbed to the top of the church tower, which has been opened for tours for the first time since the 1700s. The views across Islington and London are spectacular.


